

Dear Community,

The President and the billionaires in power are using every moment to sow fear and chaos in their ruthless plan to consolidate power. We stand with you as we endure increasing threats to our peace and safety—from ICE stops and deportations, cuts to healthcare and social safety nets, and unchecked executive power. It is more important now than ever before that we ground ourselves in our collective power and remind ourselves and our communities what we are capable of. We are the ones we are waiting for and, together, we will win.

To that end, today, we are incredibly proud to present our 2024 Impact Report. Last year, our affiliated network of 51 grassroots power-building organizations committed to using every moment to grow our leadership base, increase understanding of the issues, and prepare our people for the current moment. We focused on ensuring Black, brown, immigrant, and working-class leaders were growing the relational infrastructure needed for the road ahead.

Together, we recruited 108,000 new contacts into our network, and won 30 campaign victories and several key defensive fights that stand to bring real relief to millions of people.

While this is far from enough, it is a blueprint we can follow towards the change we wish to make. Last year was marked by an unpredictable election cycle, genocide in Palestine, natural disasters like Hurricanes Helene and Milton, and uncertainty about the fate of our democracy. But the Popular Democracy network was built for times like this. Our Network of organizers and leaders worked tirelessly to understand the needs of our communities, mobilize unlikely voters to the polls, and advance policies around affordable housing, accessible healthcare, immigrant and workers' rights, climate resilience, policefree schools, and more that matter the most to our people.

In times of crisis, creating spaces to slow down and reflect on our successes and failures as we shape our collective path forward is important. Our network came together to share lessons, strategize, laugh, cry, and remind each other who and what we are fighting for. Through art and cultural events like our Hip Hop 4 Peace concerts, a cultural caravan as part of our House Every One campaign, or election-themed murals, we reached new communities and welcomed them into our network. As co-executive directors, we seek to uplift our peoples' experiences and sharpen our vision for our future. We effectively advanced this work in 2024, reinforcing our ability to directly confront racial capitalism and the forces currently trying to deconstruct our Democracy.

As one of the largest progressive power-building networks in the country, we are well-positioned to adapt to evolving political conditions and mobilize massive numbers of people to take action. Every day, we work alongside hundreds of thousands of frontline organizers nationwide to create lasting change. Through strategic base-building, organizing to raise consciousness and shift narrative, and sustained direct action, we will not stop fighting for a true representative democracy.

Stay tuned for more on how we are fighting back in 2025 and beyond—but for now; we hope you will take a moment to read through the 2024 report that illustrates the immense power of our network and the work we have done to prepare for this moment. We cannot say enough how grateful we are for our staff, affiliates, boards, allies, funders and donors, and every single person who has taken action with Popular Democracy. You are the heart of this movement! This is a fight for liberation that is grounded in our love for humanity and JOY; today we celebrate all we've achieved together.



Our Purpose

Achieving Governing Power

At the Center for Popular Democracy (CPD), along with our sister organization Popular Democracy in Action (PDiA)—collectively Popular Democracy—we know that everyday people hold the power to change the world. We upend politics as usual to forge a representative, multiracial government and society where we all thrive—no exceptions.



How do we build this expansive base, especially among those systematically marginalized, and leverage it to attain governing power?

We employ six strategic approaches:

INCREASECAPACITY

- Recruit, train, and develop member leaders using tested base-building tactics in partnership with our affiliates
- 2. Build a strong network
 of affiliates that moves in
 powerful alignment around a
 shared purpose

- 3. Incorporate culture as a strategic tool, including using art to amplify our core messages and hosting cultural events to invite people into our movement
- **4. Deepen our analysis** of where we need to grow our base to achieve governing power, build a culture of evaluation, and share learnings across the network
- 5. Contest for narrative primacy by building a strong brand and sharing popular education to amplify our main priorities

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Through these strategies we harnessed the electoral moment of 2024 to aid in the building of lasting grassroots power. This has positioned us to ultimately achieve the transformative governing power necessary to advance racial, economic, and social justice for all communities.



Scaling our Base

Organizing Capacity Support: A vital role that CPD plays is capacity support for affiliate organizing programs. In 2024, CPD conducted rigorous organizing program assessments with each affiliate. We analyzed their strengths and areas for growth around strategic basebuilding and established a baseline of capacity and goals to strengthen their organizing infrastructure and scale their reach. Through a combination of one-on-one coaching support, in-person and virtual trainings, retreats with organizing and field teams across the network, and dedicated data support, 86% of PD affiliates demonstrated increased organizing capacity and infrastructure by the end of 2024.

Organizer Training: In 2024, the Popular Democracy network grew to over 3.5 million people. supported affiliates in strengthening their organizing capacity to scale this work, including training 71 organizers through intensive basic, advanced, and lead organizer training programs, as well as 231 organizers and member leaders in person at four multi-affiliate blitz trainings in Las Vegas, Minneapolis, Hazelton, and Phoenix which brought members and staff from 41 affiliates in community to learn and build together.

Member Leader Training: In 2024, CPD developed a four-tier member leader training program combining political education, campaign history, and basic organizing skills across 5 issue areas and trained 4,093 total people, including 1,468 individuals who completed a comprehensive 12-hour (Tier 2) training in one or more issue areas.

Scaled Basebuilding Experiment: In 2023, CPD advanced our thinking around strategic basebuilding through an initial series of experiments testing a set of outreach tactics for bringing new Black and Latine folks into a grassroots issue-campaign. In 2024, we took these learnings to the next level, with an eye towards testing not only how to best bring people into our organization, but how to move them through an engagement and leadership development pipeline to further grow our base.


We partnered with affiliates to test three models for scaling our base through a combination of initial outreach, follow up, and engagement:

- CPD partnered with 18 affiliates to test a Voter to Member program—read more about it below.
- CPD partnered with Step Up Louisiana to test a scaled two-tier relational organizing program through the Fall for Liberation project. Building on three years of small scale organizer-in-training programs that the two organizations developed together, the Fall for Liberation dramatically scaled the work and tested the capacity of organizers-in-training to recruit, develop, and activate member leaders in their base to mobilize their neighbors to 1) vote and 2) join Step Up Louisiana as members and active participants in issue-campaign work long term
- CPD advanced testing related to online to offline strategies to reach and engage new people in rapid response moments and connect them to local campaign efforts. For example, we tested the use of digital ads during periods of extreme heat or following major storms to connect people with immediate resources. We then followed up to bring them into ongoing climate justice campaign efforts. Other tests supporting housing, climate, and worker justice campaigns led by our affiliates were designed to reach key constituencies that were not reachable by traditional field or phone contact methods...

Voter To Member: CPD supported affiliate efforts to build out membership flows for new member leads that were generated via GOTV and electoral programs. 18 affiliate organizations participated in this program and each organization used varying methods to move voters into a membership flow. We provided support via initial program setup meetings, 3 in-person trainings, monthly virtual training spaces, and weekly checkins with participating affiliates to collect metrics and troubleshoot gaps or bottlenecks in the voter to member flows. As a result, affiliates successfully identified 113,231 leads from GOTV conversations into an organizing flow to join permanent membership chapters and issue campaigns while simultaneously increasing the number of dues paying members.

Our Impact

In 2024, the Center for Popular Democracy (CPD) network of 51 affiliates and allies won 30 campaign victories and over 15 key defensive fights that stand to benefit millions of people.

Here are some of the victories we delivered at the federal level and across 15 states, Washington D.C., and Puerto Rico:

JUSTICE TRANSFORMATION & EDUCATION JUSTICE

Through our affiliate cohorts and one-on-one campaign strategy support, we helped advance several wins across the network, including:

- Make the Road Pennsylvania, CASA Pennsylvania, and coalition members advocated for a statewide adoption of an equitable education funding formula that would increase money towards quality education. Their advocacy resulted in the state investing \$1B in K-12 education funding, including \$5M for Title I schools and unhoused families.
- In March, thanks to advocacy from Ohio Organizing
 Collaborative / Building Freedom Ohio, State Reps.
 Brett Hilkyer and Bill Seitz introduced the Getting
 Rehabilitated Ohioans Working (GROW) Act. This bill
 would allow certain people with criminal convictions to
 get their records automatically sealed and is estimated
 to help over 1M people.
- Since 2021, VOCAL-NY has been a strong advocate of Daniel's Law (S2398/A2210), a bill that was reintroduced by the New York state legislature in 2024. Daniel's Law would remove police officers as first responders to people experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis and instead allow social workers, mental health counselors, peers, and other health workers to step in.
- In September, alongside CPD, the People's Coalition for Safety and Freedom, launched their <u>revolutionary bill</u> <u>framework: The People's Bill</u>. These policy proposals emerged after many years of surveys, focus groups, and People's Movement Assemblies and emphasize <u>investing</u> in community instead of carceral infrastructure while promoting policies rooted in care and respect for human dignity.



HEALTHCARE

- At the federal level, CPD worked closely with affiliates around the country to secure many significant wins.
 Affiliates included SPACES In Action, Stand Up Alaska, VOCAL-NY, Make the Road NY, Center for Coalfield Justice, Texas Organizing Project, Rights & Democracy, Arkansas Community Organizations, Action North Carolina, OK Delaware, Make the Road NV, and New Georgia Project. Together we won the following:
 - Three of the top insulin manufacturers decided to extend the Inflation Reduction Act's Medicare \$35 monthly out of pocket insulin cap to people on private insurance, lowering the price of insulin for millions of people. This came after years of direct actions, civil disobedience, lobby visits, birddogging, and digital storytelling that CPD used to pass the IRA and additional public pressure to expand its cost-saving provisions to private insurance.
 - CPD and allies, as part of the Make Medicines
 Work Campaign, discussed with Sen. Sanders the
 need to pressure asthma inhaler manufacturers to
 reduce costs. As a result, three major manufacturers
 (Boehringer Ingelheim, AstraZeneca, and GSK)
 announced a \$35 a month cap for asthma inhalers.
 - OPD and our Ending the War on Drugs Coalition helped Sen. Warren redraft and reintroduce the CARE Act, the most comprehensive, progressive approach to combating the overdose epidemic in America. We held drafting sessions with affiliates and allies and negotiated the usage of more progressive language with Sen. Warren's staff. This led to the inclusion of broader prohibitions on funding going to police and mandates that people with living experience be involved in deciding where funds go.
 - The Biden administration announced the results of their negotiations with pharmaceutical companies for the first 10 medications chosen for the drug price negotiation program, created by the Inflation Reduction Act. The negotiations cut the list price for the 10 selected drugs between 38 and 79 percent, which will make it significantly easier for many people to get life-saving medications. CPD worked for years to pass Medicare drug price negotiation and get the IRA across the finish line-organizing direct actions, civil disobedience, lobby visits, birddogging, and digital storytelling.



- CPD held a Medical Debt Townhall with Rep. Ro Khanna
 to discuss the needs of our members and the importance
 of building support for the Medical Debt Cancellation
 Act that he introduced with Sen. Sanders. The bill would
 essentially eliminate existing medical debt and create
 a support infrastructure to ensure nobody lapses into
 burdensome debt in the future. We will work to pass this
 legislation in 2025.
- The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) updated regulations implementing Medicaid Advisory Committees (MACs) and Beneficiary Advisory Councils (BACs). This presents an important opportunity to enhance the role of Medicaid enrollees and other stakeholders in state Medicaid policy development and oversight. This is a direct result from the organizing from our medicaid cohort including Arkansas Community Organizations, Texas Organizing Project, New Georgia Project, Maine's People Alliance, Stand Up Alaska, SPACEs in Action, OK Delaware, Rights & Democracy-NH.

IMMIGRANT RIGHTS

- CPD and our affiliates advocated for the extension of Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for multiple countries with the goal of delaying the Trump administration's antiimmigrant agenda, securing victories for El Salvador and Venezuela early in January of 2025.
- In a move that was projected to help more than 100,000 people get health insurance, the Biden administration announced that it would expand Affordable Care Act healthcare coverage to Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients—a crucial step to getting immigrants the healthcare they need. CPD, along with partners in the ACA4DACA campaign, followed up with outreach to DACA recipients during the ACA open enrollment period.



CLIMATE JUSTICE

- In 2024, CPD affiliate Make the Road New Jersey made significant strides towards zonal decarbonization pilots by holding community meetings and having discussions with policy makers. This resulted in the creation of a zonal decarbonization pilot in a Union County, NJ municipality, connected to a geothermal network, in a neighborhood surrounding the city hall and local library. They are also in conversation with two other municipalities about city and school based pilots.
- In 2024 CPD affiliate Alliance of Californians for Community Empowerment (ACCE), alongside other partners, held community meetings, actions and meetings with policy makers on the environmental impacts of fossil fuels. This resulted in a ballot initiative to hold Chevron accountable for the environmental and climate damages it has caused. For years ACCE and their coalition partners have organized to hold Chevron accountable and in order to avoid pursuit of litigation, in 2024, Chevron agreed to settle and pay the city of Richmond \$550 million dollars over the next 10 years.
- CPD affiliate Make the Road Nevada, with the support
 of CPD, ran a campaign to do community research air
 monitoring in parts of Las Vegas that suffer from heat
 island effect—an effect that is even more heightened due
 to extreme heat days. As a result of this, street vendors
 won licences that would allow street vendors the ability to
 station their carts in places that are more protected from
 extreme heat and protect them from police harassment.
 MRNV then worked with local elected officials to submit
 license requests.



STRATEGIC INITIATIVES

Our Strategic Initiatives team incorporates culture as a catalyst for social change. Through powerful in-person cultural activations, striking public art, and impactful films, we reached thousands in-person in 11 cities, 8 states, 2 countries, and millions through our civic engagement films. Here are some highlights from 2024:

- CPD, partnering with affiliates Texas Organizing Project and VOCAL-Texas, organized a House Every One Cultural Caravan, a three-city tour across Texas amplifying our network-wide campaign's call for housing for all. This happened parallel to South by Southwest.
- Murals Unite is CPD's nationwide street art initiative to spark civic engagement and strengthen local organizing. In collaboration with world-renowned artists like Dasic Fernandez, Nelson Cekis Rivas, La Morena, Southwest Fredy, and Andre Trenier, we created murals in politically vital cities: Allentown, PA; Phoenix, AZ; Las Vegas, NV; Detroit, MI; and Long Island, NY. Each mural unveiling became a community gathering, forging deeper ties between our affiliates—including Make the Roads Nevada, Pennsylvania, and New York, Living United for Change in Arizona, and Detroit Action—and the broader Guardians of Democracy work led by CPD.
- CPD organized three major Hip Hop concerts calling for peace and delivering a powerful message of solidarity. Our concerts in Brooklyn, NY and Los Angeles, CA, featured legendary artists like Talib Kweli, Ana Tijoux, Smif-N-Wessun, Saul Williams and Immortal Technique. In Barcelona, as part of the PAH Housing Delegation (Plataforma de Afectadas por la Hipoteca) we brought together Yasiin Bey (Mos Def), Ana Tijoux, and Italian Hip Hop pioneers Assalti Frontali. Each show drew hundreds of attendees, uniting artists and communities and delivering a powerful message of solidarity. Through these initiatives, we activated new networks, empowered communities, and raised critical funds to continue our work.

ECONOMIC & WORKER JUSTICE

CPD worked with Make the Road New Jersey to educate our members and our communities about the need for more protection for temporary workers. Thanks to these efforts, NJ followed up the a groundbreaking passage of the Temp Worker Bill of Rights with model regulations, ensuring protections and standards for workers in a sector lacking real oversight for far too long are fully implemented. CPD provided critical strategic research, campaign planning and communications partnership leading to the win. The law helps ensure equal pay for temp workers, eliminates excessive temp agency fees, and adds anti-retaliation protections.

GUARDIANS OF DEMOCRACY

The Center for Popular Democracy's (CPD's) Guardians of Democracy program moves grassroots members of our affiliates into greater leadership in their organization's civic engagement and electoral work. In 2024, we held 20 Guardians of Democracy training sessions across the country in PA, ME, NY, NV, MI, LA, OH, AZ, CA, FL, NC, CT, and NJ.

We trained 672 member leaders in these sessions to serve as hyper-local "precinct leaders." Each member was provided with a contact list of 100 voters who live in their immediate neighborhood (typically on their block) and they committed to making multiple attempts to contact those voters about issues of concern in their community and about voting.

Over the course of the year, a total of **532** Guardians engaged in outreach to their list of 100 neighbors and had a total of **45,340** conversations with them. These dedicated grassroots leaders, along with those who will join as the program expands, serve as a crucial foundation for the infrastructure our movement urgently needs to build political power beyond election cycles.

RESPECT OUR VOTE

Alongside affiliates and allies in the Election Sabotage Response Network (ESRN), we prepared to protect the will of voters. In the lead-up to November, we responded to certification threats—driving hundreds of letters to targeted Georgia county election officials—and prepared the network to mobilize, if needed. We led political education teach-ins with about 250 participants across 23 affiliates, hosted safety trainings in partnership with Democracy Security Project (with 83 participants), set up a rapid response structure, and provided coordination and materials for potential nationwide, multi-city demonstrations. For the days immediately after polls closed, we brought together 57 member leaders and organizers from **eight** affiliates to Phoenix for organizing training and action-taking. Given the results, we pivoted to ballot curing, with member leaders talking to 176 Arizona voters and our National Canvass team calling 1,275 voters in key states, reaching 106 voters whose votes had been challenged.

WE RENT, WE VOTE

A related effort was CPD's We Rent, We Vote program, based on polling in battleground states that showed that the cost of housing was the number one concern and priority of renters—but one they were not hearing addressed by elected officials and candidates. We acquired data on which voters were renters and helped affiliates create voter contact universes and scripts to reach Black and brown renters who are "high potential voters" with messaging that spoke directly to their concerns about the high cost of rent.

We provided financial resources and hands-on staff support for data and training for six affiliates in five battleground states, helping those affiliates recruit over 100 outreach workers from their base of renter activists. They collectively held 56,124 conversations with Black and brown "likely renters." These resulted in 48,250 pledges to vote, 15,859 commitments to vote tripling, and 8,380 people expressing interest in getting involved with their local group.

Following the election of Trump and his campaign promises of the "largest deportation program" in US history, and witnessing the early days of the administration with its amped-up, often militarized and random deportation raids, we knew we had to step up. The CPD Immigration, Worker Justice, and Education Justice teams came together to produce a bilingual Know Your Rights Fight Back Toolkit compiling resources from affiliates, including Make the Road NY and CASA, and allies, and widely shared with our network and beyond. We The Poets A House, Rebuilt by Kyle the Jukebox

We The Poets is a bold, cultural response to the mounting attacks on the 14th Amendment, leveraging the power of spoken word to galvanize movements and drive policy change.

and built ourselves a new house.


A house where justice is the foundation,
